



Everybody is Different by Jakeida Clarke

The Youth in Motion Zine to challenge stereotypes is a Community Action project, supported by **Equitas, Speaking Rights.**


Who are we?


"I am" by LH - 13 years old






I am a good friend


I understand all my friends

I am a really really young girl ...




